We're taught that service work is the backbone of good sobriety. I would add that it's the backbone of good Christian acts as well. Please consider asking the Holy Spirit to show you someone who needs to feel safe and welcome in Calix, and be their guide.

Why Indulgences?

In this Year of Mercy, we should seek out every opportunity to grow in our Faith.

One of the most overlooked gift that the Church has are indulgences.

Catechism of the Catholic Church, states, "An indulgence is obtained through the Church who, by virtue of the power of binding and loosing granted her by Christ Jesus, intervenes in favor of individual Christians and opens for them the treasury of the merits of Christ and the saints to obtain from the Father of mercies the remission of the temporal punishment due for their sins." The Church does this not just to aid Christians, "but also to spur them to works of devotion, penance, and charity" (CCC 1478).

Short translation – this is extra credit in the spiritual life!

After we go to Confession, we do an act of penance in reparation for our sins. An indulgence is doing that act of penance outside the Sacrament of Penance.

It may offering certain prayers, particular acts of charity, or time reading Scripture.

The full list of indulgences is found in the Enchiridan of Indulgences.

One recommendation: After receiving Holy Communion, offer the Anima Christi – the Soul of Christ prayer. Offer it for the poor souls in purgatory.

And graces for you and those who have gone before marked by the sign of Faith.

Anima Christi

Soul of Christ, sanctify me. Body of Christ, save me. Blood of Christ, inebriate me. Water from the side of Christ, wash me. Passion of Christ, strengthen me. O good Jesus hear me. Within thy wounds hide me. Suffer me not to be separated from thee. From the malignant enemy, defend me. In the hour of my death, call me. And bid me come to thee;

That with thy saints I may praise thee forever and ever. Amen.

the Committee shortly. This registration with these options will be sent out via email/mail in the days ahead.


Sister Ignatia, Cause for Canonization: A few weeks ago, I learned at an AA meeting that there has been a Cause for Canonization started by a group of women in AA. As you may know, we have available on the literature list, a DVD produced by Sister's Order that summarizes her involvement in AA as well as a book published by Mary Darrah: Sister Ignatia Angel of Alcoholics Anonymous. Some of you may be aware that at the last AA International Convention, Sister's involvement was recognized by AA in a very big way. She was born in Ireland during the lifetime of Matt Talbot, came to the US, and answered her calling to become a nun. Following a breakdown suffered while Ignatia taught music, she was assigned to a hospital in Akron to aid in her personal recovery where she assisted the hospital administrator. She became Dr. Bob's right hand admitting alcoholics to the hospital and was instrumental in helping minister to the spouses and families of these persons, the start of Alanon to be sure. She and Dr.

Bob are credited with the start of successful institutionalized treatment for alcoholism in America, and the world. She and Dr. Bob got 5000 alcoholics started on the road to recovery in Akron during his lifetime (about 1 per day, a herculean feat). When he died, she was moved to Cleveland where she opened Rosary Hall Solarium (RHS being Dr Bob's initials) and got another 15,000 alcoholics started on their journey.

How special is it that we will have a talk on Sister Ignatia at the Retreat? Included in this issue is a card that promotes a Facebook page on the Cause for Sister Ignatia, for those who use Facebook.

A Small Stone

Traveling to Lourdes on pilgrimage this past April was a real privilege. The area around the Basilica of the Immaculate Conception, and the Grotto where Our Lady appeared to St. Bernadette, is known as "The Domain." Peace reigns there, and spiritual healing is available to all.

Like everyone else, I brought back a few souvenirs from Lourdes. One souvenir was a small stone from the river bank near the Grotto, a piece of limestone no bigger than the first joint of my little finger. After we had our final blessing in the Domain, it went into my pocket. Later, at home in Virginia, the Lourdes stone went into a little red rosary pouch made from a priest's used vestment. Volunteers in California sew items like rosary pouches, bible covers and such, from used vestments in order to raise money for the Roman Catholic Church in the Russian Far East. This particular pouch had not sold, and because it was cardinal red with a white, eight-point, Spanish-style cross, it became mine. It reminded me of the Order of Malta. The little stainless-steel medallion of Our Lady of Czestochowa was still in the pouch when the stone was added.

The pouch-stone-medallion stayed in my car for a while. Then one day, this "memento" went in my pocket. Everyone else brings water back from Lourdes, why bring back a stone? The answer came during the 3 O'clock Hour of Divine Mercy:

"Every one then who hears these words of mine and does them will be like a wise man who built his house upon rock; and the rain fell, and the floods came, and the wind blew and beat upon the house, but it did not fall, because it had been founded on the rock." - Mt 7:24-25

These words of Jesus conclude the Sermon on the Mount that begins with the Beatitudes (Mt 5-7). One writer has called the Beatitudes a "sort of self-portrait of Jesus." As the Word's self-portrait they describe the Rock that is salvation.

As I work my program for spiritual growth within my Calix family, there seems to be a real path forward in contemplating the Beatitudes ("hears these words") and then striving to live them ("does them"). As a practical program matter, being "poor in spirit," for example, seems like a way to practice detachment with love. The Beatitudes also suggest a way to address my "defects of character (Step 6)" and "my short-comings (Step 7)."

In contemplation, the "small stone" helped me see that the graces that come from living the Beatitudes flow like the water that flows from the rock of the Grotto, both gratuitous flows mediated by Our Lady and available to everyone.

Jesus, I trust in You.



On A Cold Winter Night

As I enjoy chiming bells from Saint Gabriel's Church across from my apartment on Pentecost Sunday, 2016, and my Thirty-Fourth Anniversary of priesthood, I beseech God's help to write this first article for the Chalice about the Calix Society.

In a God letter someone wrote:

Dear God,

So far today, I've done all right. I ain't cursed, stolen, nor lied. I haven't even smoked, used drugs, or drank alcohol—I'm really thankful for that. But in a few minutes, dear God, I'll be getting

out of bed, and then I'll need all the help I can get.

Heavenly Father, on this day of my Priestly Pentecostal Anniversary, I pray send Your Spirit upon me and grant all the help I need to inspire' the Chalice' readers about our society and for our own sobriety, sanity, and sanctity that will enable us to become Recovery Evangelizers. Amen.

In this article, I write about the First Calix Founder, William J. Montroy, and his defining 'moment of truth' that happened during the mid 1940's in downtown Minneapolis through his new found friend, Earl Rooney. In this instant, the Lord Jesus revealed himself and planted the Calix seed which was to grow into the Apostolate for Catholic Recovering Addicts.

From Bill Montroy's recorded testimony, we know that his alcoholism began with few drinks making him feel like a 'Big Shot' even though he didn't like the taste. He shuddered at the thought that some of his drinking pals needed a drink to get out of bed, and it seemed silly to him to drink alone. Yet in time, he would abuse alcohol and become just like his alcoholic buddies.

Bill's debts increased. Loan sharks hounded. Pressures mounted. Deliberately, he provoked an argument with his wife Janet, Scandinavian Lutheran, so he could blame her, slam doors, and run out of the house to get drunk. She was sick with his sickness. Even his supervisor made him sign a letter of resignation to be submitted if alcohol abuse ever again interfered with his job. Though he felt shame and sorrow, he just couldn't stop the binges.

One night in an alcoholic 'blackout', Bill drove home and tore down his garage doors. The next day, Janet and her neighbor tried to convince him to make an A.A. meeting, but he refused calling the members 'Holy Joes' and 'Know-It-Alls.' Before the insanity, he was able to borrow and steal to make ends meet. Now he couldn't even do that: people guarded themselves against his mischievous behavior. Owing creditors thousands of

dollars, he wanted to kill himself but was afraid of going to hell. Total despair crept into his wounded heart.

Sick in mind, body, and soul, Bill believed he was losing his mind. In bed with his wife one dark night and afraid of committing suicide, by jumping out the window, he tied a sheet around his wife's leg and the other end around himself.

The whole next day Janet pestered him to get help. Seeing agony in her eyes and fed-up with her nagging, he agreed to anything, saying to her, "Send anybody, the devil himself, I don't care."

Janet told her neighbor who called her brother Earl Rooney, an A.A. member and devout Catholic, about the crises. Directly, on a

street car from Saint Paul to Minneapolis, the Twelve Step messenger came to the rescue on a cold winter night. In their home, the Angel of Mercy—seeing a puffed-up face and feeling sweaty hands—gave the suffering soul a glass of whiskey to calm his jitters. Knowing the same tender love as he did from Janet and his mother, he listened to the wisdom of a new found friend.

Earl's anointed words, as he told his God Story, resonated Bill's being. Sober for three years, this A.A. sponsor shone happiness. He shared all the burdens, problems, and sufferings from his alcoholism. The way he stopped drinking, he told him, was by God's graces which he received through daily Mass and Holy Communion. These pearl eyes reflected hope as he spoke about faith: "What I started to ask you to believe (is) what really kept me going—was that I humbly and blindly accepted Jesus Christ, and what I remembered about his love and mercy, and said he must love me and will help me if I have faith."

Suddenly, hearing the Holy Name, *Jesus Christ*, spoken through the soothing voice of the Lord's prophet, the defining 'moment of truth' penetrated and dilated the heart of the upcoming First Calix Founder setting him free from his dreadful drinks.

"Why did he (meaning Earl Rooney) come to see me, on a street car on a cold winter night?" Bill asked himself.

In his own words, we have the answer: "This man Earl was to make the greatest change in my life... The thought of Calix really began to form at this first meeting with him."

To be precise, the thought of the Calix Society began by the power of the Holy Name, Jesus Christ, who gave Bill the defining 'moment of truth.' We can understand this fact from his testimony: "As he said Jesus Christ (italics mine) the sound of his voice brought this response and brought me to this decision. At this point Earl went out and came back with another glass of whiskey. I told him I had my last drink...."

Although Bill drank his last, he still needed to go through the terrible withdrawal effects of alcohol. All he wanted now and needed, he believed, was the Sacrament of

Reconciliation, daily Mass, and Holy Communion. He knew he couldn't make it over the addicted cross-road without the Lamb of God.

At the office, Bill was a wreck! His supervisor called for him to sign some forms. Shaking with papers, he couldn't write his name. The boss took the pen, threw it across the room, and in strong language told him to get out.

Straightforwardly, being divinely drawn, he ran from the building on a cold bitter day and stumbled into Saint Joseph's Church. There, at the altar steps, he fell upon his knees, crying out for divine help....

Leaving Saint Joseph's and bypassing pubs, Bill then entered his own church, Saint Stephen's, where he prayed again to Jesus Christ for help....

Making it home to his bedroom and experiencing the presence of Jesus there, he prayed a third time, crying out to Christ: "Help me! Help me!"

Because the Lord always hears the cry of the poor, Bill got better and better physically, mentally, and spiritually by acting on the Lord's amazing sacramental graces.

Through the blessings of Alcoholic Anonymous,

the blessings of Earl Rooney's daily visits, and—more importantly—the graces of the sacraments (including his marriage), Scripture, spiritual readings, Marian devotions, inspiring saints, sacramentals, and all sanctifying means of the Church, Bill gave the Lord permission to transform his life from sinfulness to gracefulness. By grace he surrendered and acted on grace; by grace he was willing to 'let go and let God'—setting the stage for the divine Calix seed to sprout, which would reveal the gracefulness of this once-upon-a-time broken man.

Here is a poem that reminds me of Mr. Montroy's graceful surrender: Letting Go and Letting God We mutter, we sputter We fume and we spurt We mumble and grumble Our feelings get hurt We don't understand things Our vision grows dim While all that we really need Is a moment with Him

"My lover speaks; he says to me, 'Arise, my beloved, my beautiful one, and come! For see, the winter is past, the rains are over and gone." Song of Songs 2: 10-11.

Inspired by the faithful examples of Earl Rooney and William J. Montroy, originators of Calix, may we surrender and act upon the Lord's sacramental graces for our own

sobriety, sanity, and sanctity. Then, as members of our society, we too will rise and become Recovery Evangelizers for God's Greater Glory and for the salvation of souls, especially on a cold winter night.

He provided insight on how we can increase our awareness of and help the poor in our midst.

The day began with Mass and included the rosary, confessions, personal prayer time, miraculous medal novena, food, fun, and fellowship. As the graces continue to flow, we look forward to next year.
