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Faith Renewal

This liturgical year we as a church are being called upon to renew our faith. A fitting subject for Calix members as it is our Catholic Faith that calls us together as a Eucharistic Community. Another term has come to the forefront in **this** year of faith renewal: **The New Evangelization.** .

Two publications have been sent to me on the subject of The New Evangelization; one is from the Catholic Information Service, sponsored by the Knights of Columbus. The title of this publication is "What is the New Evangelization?" by Michelle K. Borras. The second: "The New Evangelization, Responding to the Challenge of Indifference." The Author is Rino Fisichella. Michchelle Borras is the director of the Catholic Information Service. She has a doctorate and a number of teaching posts in related fields. Rino Fischella is the former rector of the Pontifical Lateran University and an Auxiliary Bishop of the Diocese of Rome.

Both books are extremely helpful to one interested in learning more about the rationale behind the Year of Faith and the New Evangelization. The book by Bishop Frischella is written with a sense of great urgency, as we are living in a world today of growing disbelief and a more militant anti-Christianity. I happen to strongly agree with the thesis that the forces of atheism are out to wipe the Christian message from the face of the earth. This endeavor by the dark side is not new, but the new technology of instant world wide communication makes peril to the faith of Christians ever more potent. I have underlined so many pages of each publication that adequately forming a summary statement is difficult. Let it suffice to say, that Pope John Paul II, and our present Holy Father Benedict XVI have been and are warning all of us of the need to be proactive in deepening our faith. An example: on page 22 of Bishop Frischella's book he quotes Pope John Paul II's Encyclical Redemptoris Misso: "Finally there exists an intermediate situation, often in countries of ancient Christian tradition, but at times also in younger Churches, where entire groups of the baptized have lost the living sense of the faith or no longer even recognize themselves as members of the Church, leading to an existence which is far from Christ and from his Gospel. Evangelization or a Re-Evangelization."

A week ago, National Pubic Radio had on Morning Edition for five days, fifteen minutes dedicated to the subject of the new Atheists. Every day consisted of a dialogue on the subject. As an example, on the Thursday of that week there was a conversation with a woman whose father, grandfather and great grandfather were Lutheran Pastors. She is now married to a man who professes to be an Atheist. On Friday of that week, there was a dialogue with a Franciscan Priest in Chicago and a minister in Austin, Texas who both work with the new generation of unbelievers. No answers were given, but the situation is recognized as a public service. Another example of the situation facing us today was highlighted by Bishop Frischella, when he spoke of the fact that the New European Constitution makes no mention of the contribution of Christianity to the development of the European Countries and Cultures. This fact was addressed personally by Pope John Paul II to the leaders of the European Nations.

In focusing on the challenge of being a Christian today, living by indifferent isms... agnosticism, prevent us from achieving in a full sense the search for the truth. None of us should fall into the trap of thinking about our own country while forgetting that its roots are steeped in a faith, which for centuries, has fed peaceful coexistence and the progress of different people. There cannot be a modern society worthy of its name while leaving out the Catholic contribution. More on the subject in future articles.



Thoughts on Calix during Lent

On February 17th, I'll be honored to escort one of York's members to the cathedral for her Rite of Election. This is the second time in our short history as a Calix Group that a member has made the decision to become Catholic. It brings to mind memories of my own conversion through RCIA and how my journey in recovery has been enhanced by our Faith.

I also look forward to the Mass where our Calix Group is offered the Sacrament of the Sick which has become a Lenten tradition since we formed our group. Does your group do anything special during the Lenten Season? One thought that was formed within me when we used Fr Harbaugh book (Twelve Steps and Spiritual Exercises) was "What am I holding onto that prevents me from growing closer to Jesus?" What impact does this question have when I expand it to the group level? What is my group doing to attract new members? Is there something our group does that makes it difficult to remain attractive and interesting to current members? Such reflection and group inventory, akin to pruning away of older wood as described in the Gospels, may result in new growth in each group.

Within the past month, the Board of Directors launched a new project, the Liaison Project, designed to enhance communications

The moon takes nearly twenty-eight days to make a complete, elliptical cycle around our planet and the same amount of time to complete a spin on her individual axis. A human woman takes that same amount of time to complete her womanly cycle of reproduction.

When we burn the herbs and make our ceremony, He becomes delighted and mesmerized with the sacrifice of our precious time.
