



Then we had a couple of speakers after more food at lunch. Dick Rice of The Retreat was wonderful as he told his story of recovery and his experience of steps 6, 7 and 11.

Jim Billigmeier brought the group up to date on the some of the important things going on at the national level including the financial report and a summary of new activity around the country. The business portion of the weekend concluded with the election of our new president and vice president, Mike S. from York, PA and Margo E. from Seattle, WA, respectively. I would also like to thank Ed. K. from Omaha for his willingness to serve the society. It is great to know that we have such dedicated members in the society that are willing to serve! Amy and I will remain on the board and look forward to maintaining the energy and momentum that we saw at the convention.

Saturday evening we had a delicious dinner followed by an outstanding talk by Dr. John McDougall from Hazelden. I was literally crying as a result of his humor. And it reminded me of how in the rooms we find ourselves smiling and even laughing out loud at some of the most tragic things that happen in one's lives. It is only because we understand that we can laugh. I think others that are not familiar with the 12-steps and recovery meetings would have been dumbfounded by

Dr. McDougall's talk of torture as a youngster, yet he shared it in such a way that we knew the tragedy, but because he was there we already knew about some of the results. My key takeaway from his talk was the idea of the "more" and "enough" buttons. "Normal" people have both; we alcoholics and addicts only have a "more" button.

Sunday morning started with Mass with Archbishop John Niensted and then breakfast and a farewell. The morning flew by and before I knew it Fr. John L., Harry M, Joe McG and I were back in the car for our trek back to Philadelphia. I calculated that between driving, meals and hotel stops we spent some 67 hours together travelling to and from St. Paul. There were many laughs as well as serious conversations about ourselves and our faith. I still laugh thinking about some of the things that went on, not the least of which was Fr. John's PTSD (post traumatic salmon disorder!) You'll have to ask him about it the next you see him.

Plans are now underway for next year's convention to be held October 4-6, 2013 in Las Vegas. We will provide information as it becomes available. In the meantime start putting away some money each week. It would be great to see you there!!

Finally – thank you for a great two years serving as President of this fine organization. Whispers of the Spirit

A whisper from the Spirit of Creation can be as subtle as a gentle breeze or as unmistakable as a siren that cuts through the silence of the night. It refuses to be ignored but hesitates to dominate. These whispers are fragments of wisdom that seek residence in the homelands of the human soul. Whispers of the Spirit have been called "aha moments", "spiritual awakenings", "epiphanies" and "messages from the Divine". They are personal revelations that change us from immature people into altruistic spiritual beings. They come in many forms and can appear any time or anywhere. Often they appear in our dreams. Other times, we may hear them spoken by someone at a meeting or in a spiritual ceremony. We can experience them in quiet reflective moments as words, phrases, ideas or even visions. I once listened to a Catholic Native American Bishop who spoke at a conference. He was discussing bridging the gap between various religions and native cultural belief systems. He talked about the remarkable number of native people who have these stirrings of the Great Spirit in the form of "visions". As a Roman Catholic priest, he referred to the spirit inside all of us as the Holy Spirit and asked us if we know where that Spirit does His best work with native peoples. When no one offered an answer, he suggested the Holy Spirit lives and

works within the human imagination! He suggested that if we are in a humble prayerful state of seeking our Creator's will for us, we will receive direction because no prayer goes unanswered.

Many of the world's ancient religions, including American Indian culture, use ceremonies of purification to help insure against misguided or unwanted messages from entities other than their own chosen Highest Deity or belief system. Some Tribes use a smudge ceremony, sweat lodge or pipe ceremony to purify the participants. Hebrew ceremonies have included ritual washings, and Christians often use holy water and make the sign of the cross. Many cultures use fasting to clear the body, mind and spirit of the distractions of worldly thoughts and desires. Often these whispers of the Great Spirit can seem quite mysterious or even be so far removed from our expectations that they are extremely difficult to comprehend, understand or accept at first. That's why it is always wise to seek the counseling of a trusted elder, spiritual director or sponsor as we attempt to enter into a spiritual journey. Sometimes the things we seek or pray for will not be revealed to us without a learning experience that prepares us for the lasting wisdom we seek. For example, we might seek a transformation into a position of leadership only to discover we are suddenly faced with an individual who is nearly impossible to tolerate. We begin to question our ability to lead anyone, as we find ourselves caught in some petty battle of wits. This can result in the awareness of a call from the Spirit to rise above the conflict, detach from the problem and live in the solution. And so we find our-

selves growing through the conflict and moving closer to the position of leadership. Our prayers were indeed answered by the lessons learned.

Time spent in the wilderness can provide the opportunity for higher contact with the Spiritual Force of Creation. Native peoples often talk about our relationship with animals, plants and other elements of the natural world. Various animals are considered messengers concerning our own human behavior. Their antics have the ability to tell us things about ourselves. Some people believe that any time a certain animal enters our lives; we need to pay attention to its behavior and take it personally, because our Creator may be using that animal to guide and direct our thinking and self-awareness. As we learn to observe and respect the natural environment, we feel closer to the whispers of the Great Spirit.
