The theme for this year's retreat is "I Shall Take the Chalice of Salvation", taken from Psalm 116.

I'm told that this is very near such national Catholic treasures as the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception, the Franciscan Monastery of the Holy Land in America and the Saint John Paul II Shrine. Also, I wrote in the last edition of the Chalice about the Board of Directors' efforts at considering the words that make up our Calix Credo. The Board continues to work on this topic, and we hope to be able to share the outcome in the next edition of the Chalice. We have been entrusting our efforts to the aid of the Holy Spirit, and I ask that you pray for our endeavor too. In the meantime, I wanted to share that one of the outcomes of this work has been the "unearthing" of invaluable pieces of Calix history. We will be sharing some of this history in the Chalice, and this edition of the Chalice begins with a letter from Pope Paul VI, dated May 11, 1974. It's amazing to think about what Calix was like when this letter was written.

The Power Greater Than Ourselves, by Fr. Doug McKay, Calix Chaplain

An A.A. man once asked me, "What is the most important step?"

"The first step?" I answered.

"No," he said, "The door step!"

Truly, the addict needs to show up at meetings and admit powerlessness over addiction and that his life is not only unmanageable but unbearable as well. Also, one should realize that God himself is the One who empowers addicts to show up at A.A., N.A., and all other 12-Step programs. As Catholics we already came to believe in Jesus Christ, the Power greater than ourselves, who restores us to Himself. He is the Vine, we are the branches. Apart from Him we can do nothing, and nothing means nothing. He is the One, there is no other, who sets us free from our powerlessness over alcohol, other drugs, and all other addictions. He alone empowers us to conquer all addictions, once we act on His power.

Our First Calix Founder, William J. Montroy, gives his testimony about his own powerlessness over alcohol and about his moment of truth. His defining moment to conquer his alcoholic addiction came through Earl Rooney who was working the 12th Step. It was a cold winter night, after Montroy's 'Black Out' from alcohol, that Rooney confronted this almost hopeless and suicidal man with his knowledge of how he himself stopped drinking. His new found friend speaks about the Power of the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass and Holy Communion. He goes on to say to his addicted new friend, "...what really kept me going—was that I humbly and blindly accepted Jesus Christ..."

Apart from Him we can do nothing.
And nothing means nothing.

Suddenly, hearing the Holy Name, *Jesus Christ*, Montroy receives his moment of truth with a powerful desire to stop drinking. He believed that the Lord Himself could and would heal and restore him. By acting on grace infusions, he shows up at Church and A.A. meetings to deepen his sobriety, sanity, and sanctity. Empowered by Christ and acting on his faith this recovering alcoholic restores his Catholic life, never drinks again, and goes on to become the Father of our Calix Society to proclaim Jesus Christ, the Power greater than ourselves.

And it was the same Truth, Jesus Christ, who set Venerable Matt Talbot, our Calix patron, free from his alcohol addiction. His defining moment came in 1884 when friends refused to buy him a drink. Crushed in spirit, and perhaps even suicidal, he goes to a nearby bridge and ponders his powerless and unmanageable life. There, he comes to believe in the Power greater than himself. Acting on his faith, that same day, he goes to confession, takes the pledge from his confessor, and becomes a daily communicant. Instead of attending A.A. meetings, which weren't around at the time, he attends church meetings, becomes a Secular Franciscan, and joins the Pioneers. Never to drink again.

Someday soon, we hope and pray, that our One, Holy, Catholic, and Apostolic Church will canonize this mystic to become Saint Matt Talbot, patron of addicts, because of his heroic faith.

However, we must always remember that faith isn't magical. It doesn't act on us like 'abracadabra' or 'presto'. No, like Bill and Matt, we must act upon it! "Not everyone who says to me, 'Lord, Lord' will enter the kingdom of heaven, but only the one who does the will of my Father in heaven." Matthew 7:21. And this 'will of the Father' is that we humbly believe and act upon *the* Power, there is no other, greater than ourselves. Then and only then, can we conquer all things in Him who strengthens us, even our addictions.

There is a story about a poor man who subscribed to different magazines about rich and famous people. Daily, he would dream about living a wealthy and extravagant life. Then one day, while digging on his land, the dreamer struck a gushing oil well. Becoming wealthy on the spot, he bought tuxedos, cigars, horses, and a convertible Cadillac. He just couldn't wait to go through the town and show himself off in front of his friends.

Finally, he got his sunny day in his convertible Cadillac. Wearing a tux and puffing a cigar, he stood up on the seat behind the wheel and traveled through the town waving to his friends without watching the road. Safely though he journeyed, without any accidents, because a team of horses pulled the vehicle in the sight of laughing bystanders. For whatever reason, this poor man never realized that a hundred

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horse power was under the car's hood ready and rearing to go at the turn of a key.

"How dumb!" the spectators gossiped.

Now—let it be known, let it be written—how dumber we are than that poor dreamer and powerless when we don't turn our hearts towards Jesus Christ and believe and act on the Power greater than ourselves.


Calix Prayers


At the weekly Calix meetings in Leesburg, VA, we "set the stage" for the meeting by putting up a Calix sign outside the door, a framed picture of Jesus' Divine Mercy picture, a Calix banner – "I Thirst" – and a statue of Matt Talbot.

We begin the meeting with the recitation of the Divine Mercy chaplet. Extra rosaries and pamphlets to help newcomers (and regulars!) follow the prayers of the chaplet are placed on the coffee tables.

We then recite the 12 Steps of AA, which are hanging on the wall. The Calix Credo is read, and then the meeting shares begin.

The meeting closes with the group forming a circle, joining hands, and reciting the Our Father, Hail Mary, Glory Be, St. Michael prayer, the Miraculous Medal prayer, and the words "Standing By, Standing Ready, Standing Tall!" which was introduced to us by a previous spiritual director.

Prayer to St. Michael the Archangel

St. Michael the Archangel, defend us in battle. Be our protection against the wickedness and snares of the Devil. Amen.

During that trip, they were incredibly blessed to have an audience with Pope Paul VI, who spoke directly to them. Below are the words of congratulations and encouragement spoken from the Holy Father to our beloved Calix Society.



ADDRESS OF THE HOLY FATHER PAUL VI TO THE MEMBERS OF THE CALIX SOCIETY

Saturday, 11 May 1974

We are happy to greet members of the Calix Society on the twenty-fifth anniversary of their foundation. As we welcome you on your pilgrimage to the See of Peter, we express our appreciation of your earnest commitment to working for the elimination of alcoholic abuse, including alcoholism itself.

In our apostolic ministry we are deeply aware of the gravity of this problem and how it is closely linked to the overall problem of drug abuse. We see the disastrous effects that these disorders have on so many people throughout the world: the effects on the individual, on families, on communities.

We know moreover the effects on society as a whole.

We see how widespread alcoholic abuse is and how it causes great human suffering, anguish and deterioration - even death. It produces marked disorientation of the whole person, especially when accompanied by grave lack of personal responsibility and by serious sin. To be properly confronted, alcoholic abuse and, in particular, alcoholism must be fully understood with all their various implications: physical, psychological, moral and religious. In this way, rehabilitation can be effectively undertaken. We know that this rehabilitation of those in need calls for fraternal interest and professional help on the part of others, together with strict personal discipline and repeated and sustained effort.

We are greatly pleased, therefore, to express our sincere and lively commendation of the valued efforts that are being made by many through the application of the appropriate natural means. We are even more pleased when efforts, like your own, take into account supernatural reality and admit the impact that must come from Christian principles and from the exercise of the Catholic faith. In recognizing a dimension-beyond natural forces-needed for the cure of alcoholism and for the Christian reconciliation of persons afflicted thereby, you are in effect finding yet another application of the broad and time-proven principle enunciated by Saint Thomas- a principle expressing an immutable relationship between nature and grace: *gratia perficit naturam* (Cfr. S. TH. *I*, q. 1. a. 8 ad 2).

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ADDRESS OF THE HOLY FATHER PAUL VI TO THE MEMBERS OF THE CALIX SOCIETY

Saturday, 11 May 1974

We rejoice to see how many people esteem recourse to a higher power in overcoming the problems related to alcoholic abuse. And worthy of special mention is the fact that you identify this higher power as the supernatural grace of Jesus Christ, the healing power of his word and of his sacraments. In this latter regard we are happy to encourage you to draw special attention to the Sacrament of Reconciliation and to the Eucharist. We are confident moreover that your efforts, motivated as they are by authentic Christian concern for your fellowmen in need, will be effective in helping them to undergo the genuine *metanoia* of true renewal and reconciliation.

We express our double insistence on the need of taking into account both nature and grace for the benefit of the unified whole which is the new man in Jesus Christ.

You have chosen to look upon Matt Talbot as an admirable exemplar of discipline and supernatural virtue. It is our hope that his success will encourage countless men and women throughout the world to realize the need for conversion, the possibility of real rehabilitation, the serenity of Christian reconciliation, and the peace and joy of helping others to overcome abuses, disorders and sin.

May your efforts and those of all men endeavouring to assist in such an important work be blessed by God, "in whom we live and move and have our being" (Cfr. Act. 17, 28), and without whose help we are incapable of supernatural conversion.

And with the expression of our hope goes our Apostolic Blessing.
